Annual Town Meeting  
Lancaster, New Hampshire  
March 10, 2020

At 7:30 pm Moderator John L Riff, IV opened the Annual Meeting.

Moderator Riff introduced himself and then introduced Edward Samson, Town Manager who said a few words of thanks to Ann Huddleston, Town Treasurer for her over 40 years of service to the Town. Ann decided not to run for another term. Moderator Riff then introduced the Boy Scouts to present the colors. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Isabella Gaetjens-Oleson then sang the National Anthem.

Moderator Riff reviewed the ground rules: He will read the article and ask for a motion and a second. If we get a second, then we will open the floor to discussion. Once discussion is over, we will move it for a vote. He would like to request that people keep comments to a minute or less to keep the meeting moving. It is also subject to how the conversation is going. He expressed that he expects everyone to keep the discussion civil.

Article 1 results, voted on by written ballot during the day, attached.

Article 2 results, voted on by written ballot during the day, attached.

Article 3 – Operating Budget – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Six Million Six Hundred Ninety-One Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-Two Dollars (\$6,691,672.00)** which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include any other Warrant Articles.

Moved by Selectman Stickney and seconded by Selectman Enos.

Moderator Riff asked if there was any discussion on the article. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 3 by show of voter cards – Article 3 carried.

Article 4 – Appropriate to Capital Reserve – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00)** to be added to the following Capital Reserve Fund accounts previously established for the purpose and in the amounts indicated:

Highway	\$40,000
Fire Department	\$20,000
Library	\$ 5,000
Cemetery	\$10,000
Total	\$75,000

(Recommended by the Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee)

Moved by Selectman Enos and seconded by Selectman Rideout.

Terri Anderson asked if the extra \$5,000 was for tree removal. Selectmen Rideout mentioned it was for maintenance. Linda Hutchins, Cemetery Trustee stated it was aimed specifically for tree removal. There are many trees that need to come down. There was no further discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 4 by show of voter cards. Article 4 carried.

Article 5 – Reimburse Industrial Development Fund – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Twenty-Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Nineteen Dollars (\$28,819.00)** to be added to the Industrial Development Capital Reserve Fund previously established with the said funds to come from the unassigned fund balance. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee)

Moved by Selectman Stickney and seconded by Selectman Enos.

Mr. Samson explained that these are funds are principal and interest that are reimbursed by the businesses that have requested a loan from the Industrial Development Fund to assist in improving or starting their business. Terri Anderson asked if there is a set amount that is given to assist businesses. Ed explained that there is not a set amount. It depends on the needs of the business and what they are requesting for funding. There was no further discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 5 by show of voter cards. Article 5 carried.

Article 6 – Money received from fundraising & donations – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Nine Thousand Three Hundred Sixty-Three Dollars (\$9,363.00)** to be added to the Colonel Town Capital Reserve Fund previously established with said funds to come from the unassigned fund balance. The amount represents monies from donations to Colonel Town Recreation. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee)

Moved by Selectman Rideout and seconded by Selectman Stickney.

Moderator Riff asked if there was any discussion on the article. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 6 by show of voter cards. Article 6 carried.

Article 7 – Town Office renovations – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00)** for the purpose of renovating the town offices, add a handicap ramp to the lobby of the town hall auditorium and contributing to the cost of curtains for the stage and to authorize the withdrawal and expenditure of said sum from the Town Hall Improvement Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee)

Moved by Selectman Enos and seconded by Selectmen Rideout.

Moderator Riff asked if there was any discussion on the article. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 7 by show of voter cards. Article 7 carried.

Article 8 – New Loader – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Hundred Twenty-Six Thousand Dollars (\$126,000.00)** for the purpose of purchasing a new loader for the Highway Department with said funds to come from the unassigned fund balance.

Moved by Selectman Stickney and seconded by Selectman Rideout.

Selectman Enos stated the current loader is in need of replacing. He reviewed the issues with the current loader and the need for a new one. Dana Southworth asked what the trade in value was on the old loader. Leo stated it is \$49,000 - \$52,000. There was no further discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 8 by show of voter cards. Article 8 carried.

Article 9 – Lease/Purchase New Sidewalk Plow – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to enter into a three-year lease agreement for **One Hundred Ninety-One Thousand One Hundred Six Dollars (\$191,106.00)** for the purpose of leasing a sidewalk plow for the Highway Department, and to raise and appropriate the sum of **Sixty-Three Thousand Seven Hundred Two Dollars (\$63,702.00)** for the first year's payment for that purpose with said funds to come from the unassigned fund balance. This lease agreement contains an escape clause. (Majority vote required)

Moved by Selectman Rideout and seconded by Selectman Enos.

Mr. Samson spoke to the article. He mentioned that the most recent Holder sidewalk plow we purchased has been nothing but trouble. At this time, it has a cracked oil pan and the issue with this model is the oil pan is molded into the frame. Cassandra Percey asked if we used the new one this year and if that is what we want to keep. She asked what the problems are with the one they want to get rid of. Ed said it has had several problems, cracked windshield, cracked oil pan. He explained that the costs of the repairs is tremendous. Don Fredette wanted to commend the town for this lease/purchase plan as it is more cost effective for the town and the operator does a great job keeping the sidewalks clear. There was no other discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 9 by show of voter cards. Article 9 carried.

Article 10 – Purchase New Ambulance – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$140,000.00)** for the purchase of a new ambulance for the Fire Department with said funds to come from the unassigned fund balance.

Moved by Selectman Enos and seconded by Selectman Stickney.

Randy Flynn, Fire Chief explained the ambulance they are looking to replace is a 2010 with 227,000 miles and is worn out. The plan is to purchase another van which is more economical. Barry Crawford asked why we need another ambulance when we already have 6 ambulances. Randy explained that this is not an additional ambulance it is a replacement and also mentioned we have 5 ambulance not 6. Moderator Riff stated the 6 ambulances listed in the town report was a clerical error. Mr. Samson mentioned the ambulance generates a large amount of revenue to offset their expenditures and then some.

Pidy Rochefort asked what is the unassigned fund balance? Ed explained it is unexpended appropriations and excess revenues collected from previous years. Rob Christie pointed out the report on the fund balance in the town report.

Dana Southworth asked if there is any trade in or resale value to get rid of the ambulance being replaced. Chief Flynn mentioned it is more cost effective to use the old one for parts. There was no other discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 10 by show of voter cards. Article 10 carried.

Article 11 – Purchase Air Packs – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Forty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000.00)** for the purchase of 6 air packs for the Fire Department with said funds to come from the unassigned fund balance.

Moved by Selectman Enos and seconded by Selectman Stickney.

Selectman Stickney explained that the air packs are for the fire department and several years ago we were fortunate enough to get a grant to replace all of our air packs. Unfortunately, now they are expiring at the same time. This request to replace 6 at this time to get replacing them on a rotating schedule. There was no further discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 11 by show of voter cards. Article 11 carried.

Article 12 – Purchase Radios & Mobile Equipment – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Forty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000.00)** for the purpose of purchasing radios and mobile equipment for the Fire Department and to authorize the withdrawal and expenditure of said sum from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee)

Moved by Selectman Stickney and seconded by Selectman Rideout.

Ted Joubert, Assistant Chief spoke to the article explaining they are looking to replace out dated equipment. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 12 by show of voter cards. Article 12 carried.

Article 13 – Purchase Cardiac Monitors – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to enter into a three year lease agreement for **One Hundred Five Thousand Dollars (\$105,000.00)** for the purpose of leasing 3 cardiac monitors for the Fire Department, and to raise and appropriate the sum of **Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00)** for the first year's payment with said funds to come from the unassigned fund balance. This lease agreement contains an escape clause. (Majority vote required)

Moved by Selectman Enos and seconded by Selectman Stickney.

Ted Joubert, Assistant Chief spoke to the article explaining what the monitors do for the patients and that the current ones we have will no longer be supported. He also mentioned these are the last to be replaced to get the ambulances up to date. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 13 by show of voter cards. Article 13 carried.

Article 14 – Purchase Grader Tires – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Fourteen Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$14,400.00)** for the purpose of purchasing six (6) grader tires for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal and expenditure of said sum to come from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee)

Moved by Selectman Stickney and seconded by Selectman Rideout.

Selectmen Enos spoke to the article explaining the tires on the grader are very worn and mentioned that Tim Brown, Highway Foreman has a future plan to take the grader out of the plowing rotation which will help save on the tires.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 14 by show of voter cards. Article 14 carried.

Article 15 – Upgrade/Renovate Col Town apartment kitchen – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00)** for the purpose of updating/renovating the kitchen in the apartment at the Colonel Town house with said funds to come from the unassigned fund balance.

Moved by Selectman Enos and seconded by Selectman Rideout.

Mr. Samson spoke to the article explaining there has not been much upkeep to the kitchen and the wiring also needs to be replaced. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 15 by show of voter cards. Article 15 carried.

Article 16 – Engineering designs – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00)** for the purpose of hiring an engineer to design roadway reconstruction on Bunker Hill Street from Main to Summer Street in conjunction with the renovation of the old Parker J. Noyes building. The designs will be to replace water and sewer infrastructure, redesign the drainage of the municipal parking lot to include separating the store water runoff from the sewer system, redesign the parking along Bunker Hill Street and the municipal parking lot behind the PJ Noyes building, and to redesign the sidewalk along the street with said funds to come from the unassigned fund balance.

Moved by Selectman Stickney and seconded by Selectman Enos.

Selectmen Rideout spoke to the article and mentioned that during the renovations the board has looked into making structural updates to the parking lots and sidewalks. Jay Lavoie asked if the plans were going to push parking into the park along the side of Bunker Hill Street. Leon explained things are very preliminary and many options are being explored. Lucy Wyman asked if the proposed designs will be posted somewhere to be reviewed by the public. Selectmen Rideout explained there will be a public hearing when plans have been designed. There was no further discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 16 by show of voter cards. Article 16 carried.

Article 17 – Playground Project – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00)** for the purpose of upgrading the playground at the Colonel Town Recreation facility with **Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00)** to come from the unassigned fund balance and the remaining **Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00)** to come from grant funding. This special warrant article will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the playground upgrade is completed or by March 10, 2025, whichever is sooner. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee)

Moved by Selectman Rideout and seconded by Selectman Stickney.

Mr. Samson spoke to the article explaining it is the same article as last year however the grant funding was not followed through with so we need make the request again this year and a non-lapsing clause was added to the article. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 17 by show of voter cards. Article 17 carried.

Article 18 – CASA – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00)** for the support of CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) of New Hampshire.

Article was moved by Benjamin Gaetjens-Oleson and seconded by Kristen Van Bergen.

Benjamin Gaetjens-Oleson explained that CASA is an organization that assists children that are abused and neglected that are somehow involved in the court system for no fault of their own.

The main purpose of the money is to help find and train the advocates that help with the children. Unfortunately, there is a growing need for advocates every year and this money will go to helping find more advocates and training them. He reviewed several statistics on the number of kids receiving services. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 18 by show of voter cards. Article 18 carried.

Article 19 – Tri-County Transit – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00)** for the support of Tri-County Transit.

Article was moved by Troy Merner and seconded by Harry Hikel.

Kathy Wiles from Tri County Community Action, a non-resident, was granted permission by the voters to speak to the article.

She reported the statistics regarding the number of trips for Coos County residents. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 19 by show of voter cards. Article 19 carried.

Article 20 – Northern Human Services/White Mountain Mental Health – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Five Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty-One Dollars (\$5,921.00)** for the support of Northern Human Services/White Mountain Mental Health.

Article was moved by Benjamin Gaetjens-Oleson and seconded by Sue Gaetjens-Oleson.

Suzanne Gaetjens-Oleson spoke to the article explaining their services. She gave the statistic for 2019 to include the number hours of service. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 20 by show of voter cards. Article 20 carried.

Article 21 – Senior Meals of Coos County – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500.00)** for the support of the Senior Meals of Coos County Program.

Article was moved by Rob Christie and seconded by Allison Breault.

Lynn Holly, Tri-County CAP representative, a non-resident, was granted permission by the voters to speak to the article.

She explained what the program does and gave statistics on the program for 2019. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 21 by show of voter cards. Article 21 carried.

Article 22 – Northern Gateway Chamber of Commerce – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Thousand Six Hundred Forty Dollars (\$1,640.00)**, for the support of the Northern Gateway Regional Chamber of Commerce.

Article was moved Amy Landry and seconded Benjamin Gaetjens-Oleson.

Linda Hutchins, member of the Chamber spoke to the article explaining what the Chamber does for the community by promoting local businesses. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 22 by show of voter cards. Article 22 carried.

Article 23 – Center for New Beginnings – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00)** to help support the Center for New Beginnings in Littleton, which provides counseling and mental health services to individuals throughout the North Country.

Article was moved by Linda Ogle and seconded by Rob Christie.

Center for New Beginnings representative, a non-resident, was granted permission by the voters to speak to the article explaining their services and reported the statistics for those served by the program in 2019. Don Williams asked if the Town of Littleton also contributes to the fund and she replied no, because they receive a property tax exemption from the Town of Littleton. There was no other discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 23 by show of voter cards. Article carried.

Article 24 – Caleb Interfaith Volunteer Caregivers – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00)** for the support of the Caleb Interfaith Volunteer Caregivers who serves the needs of senior citizens in the community.

Article was moved by Peter Riviere and seconded Benjamin Gaetjens-Oleson.

Peter Riviere spoke to the article. He explained that Caleb provides services to the elderly in the community. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 24 by show of voter cards. Article 24 carried.

Article 25 – Tri-County CAP Energy Services Program – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Four Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$4,600.00)** for the support of the Tri-County Community Energy Services Program.

Article was moved by Lynn Fuller and seconded by Troy Merner.

Kathy Wiles, Tri-County Community Action representative spoke to the article. She reported the 2019 statistics for Coos County. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 25 by show of voter cards. Article carried.

Article 26 – North Country Home Health & Hospice – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Seventeen Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety-One Dollars (\$17,991.00)** for the support of North Country Home Health & Hospice Agency.

Article was moved by Lynn Fuller and seconded by Lyndall Demers.

Lindsay Foss, a non-resident, was granted permission by the voters to speak to the article. She reviewed the services they provide. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 26 by show of voter cards. Article carried.

Article 27 – ServiceLink – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$1,820.00)** for the support of Coos ServiceLink Resource Center.

Article was moved by Kristen Van-Bergen and seconded by Troy Merner.

Lynn Holly from Tri-County CAP spoke to the article. Lynn reported how many residents have received services from ServiceLink. Cassandra Percey asked what they do? Lynn explained that they are a resource center that help people get connected to whatever services they are in need of. They do a lot of assisting with Medicare applications. There was no further discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 27 by show of voter cards. Article carried.

Article 28 – Mt. Washington Regional Airport – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Three Thousand Seven Hundred Eighty-Six Dollars (\$3,786.00)** for the Town's share of the operating budget for the Mt. Washington Regional Airport for the current fiscal year.

Article was moved by Dana Southworth and seconded by Barbara Robarts.

Wendy Roberts, a non-resident, was granted permission by the voters to speak to the article.

Wendy explained what the airport has done over the past year and that they have seen an increase in traffic, most of it for business. Ann Florio asked if they sold fuel and what was their net profit. Wendy replied, they do sell fuel and overall it is about \$15,000. Ann also asked if other towns participate in support as well. Wendy said yes and this year Twin Mountain put an article for funding on their warrant to join the airport so they anticipate the other towns contribution going down due to that. Wendy reviewed the many ways they raise funds to support the airport. There was no other discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 28 by show of voter cards. Article 28 carried.

Article 29 – Homeless Intervention & Prevention – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty-Eight Dollars (\$1,758.00)** for the support of Tri-County CAP's Homeless Intervention and Prevention Program.

Article was moved by Kristen Van-Bergen and seconded by Linda Ogle.

Matt from the Tyler Blane House, a non-resident was granted permission by the voters to speak to the article.

He explained what homeless intervention and prevention provides for services. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 29 by show of voter cards. Article 29 carried.

Article 30 – NH North Country Veterans Inc. – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00)** for the support of the New Hampshire North Country Veterans Inc.

Article was moved by Lynn Fuller and seconded by Chris St.Cyr.

Rob Christie asked what they do? Chris St.Cyr spoke to the article explaining that the organization started around 2010. They have events where veterans can come together to share where to get services, etc. There was no other discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 30 by show of voter cards. Article 30 carried.

Article 31 – Soup Kitchen – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00)** for the support of the Lancaster Soup Kitchen. (Submitted by Petition) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee)

Article was moved by Lynn Fuller and seconded by Ann Florio.

Harry Hikel spoke to the article explaining what the soup kitchen provides and statistics of those served at the soup kitchen. He mentioned they receive donations from Shaw's and Walmart to help with costs. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 31 by show of voter cards. Article 31 carried.

Article 32 – Food Pantry – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00)** for the support of the Lancaster Food Pantry. (Submitted by Petition) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee)

Article was moved by Ann Florio and seconded by Rick Bernier.

Harry Hikel spoke to the article explaining what services they provide and reported the statistics. There was no discussion.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 32 by show of voter cards. Article 32 carried.

Article 33 – Video Recording & Streaming – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00)** for the purpose of video recording and streaming of bi-monthly select board meetings at the Town Hall. (Submitted by Petition) (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee)

Article was moved by Lynn Fuller and seconded by Linda Ogle.

Lucy Wyman spoke to the article. She stated that for 3 years she has been trying to get streaming/recording done at the bimonthly Board of Selectmen meetings. She explained the many resources that are available to stream meetings and she feels it is the Selectmen's responsibility to provide these services to the community. She reviewed her many attempts to have the meetings streamed and other entities that stream their meetings.

Lynn Fuller made a motion and seconded by Nancy Kirks to end the discussion. Moderator Riff called for a vote to end discussion by show of voter cards. Motion carried.

Moderator Riff called for a vote on Article 33 by show of voter cards. Lucy requested a count. Moderator Riff called for a second show of voter cards. 30 in favor. 51 against. Article 33 failed.

Article 34 – Backpack Feeding Program – Read by Moderator Riff.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **Two Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$2,400.00)** to assist with the cost of the weekend "Backpack" feeding program which St. Paul's Episcopal Church, 113 Main Street, Lancaster, NH, currently funds.

Article was moved by Lynn Fuller and seconded by Harry Hikel.

Michael Kopp spoke to the article. He explained that the program provides take home meals for kids who may not get regular meals. Linda Ogle mentioned 44% of kids are suffering from food deficiencies. This is a volunteer program which runs off donations. Don Williams asked if they follow up on the kids and their families. He is concerned other supervision may be needed for

the kids and families. He knows they are doing a great job. Mike said it has been difficult to identify the need other than getting the information they are receiving from the free/reduced lunch program.

Rob Christie wanted to clarify that the students that are receiving the services are those that are receiving free/reduced lunches during the school day. This program is to bridge the gap over the weekend with meals they may not be getting.

There are 196 students eligible and 99 have given permission to have backpack meals provided.
